Wood Mice	Hedgehogs
<p>Description Wood mice have sandy brown fur on top of their bodies and white fur underneath their bodies. They have large ears and eyes and a long tail. They use their large ears and eyes to find their way in the dark.</p> <p>Habitat Wood mice live in woodlands, fields, hedgerows, meadows, ditches, verges and gardens. They dig burrows where they make an area for storing food and a nesting chamber for the young. Wood mice often live in gardens, in or near sheds and outbuildings. Gardens don't like them digging up their seeds!</p> <p>Diet Wood mice are mostly omnivores which means they feed mainly on seeds, seedlings, nuts, fruit and bulbs. When these are scarce, they also eat insects, earthworms and larvae. They hunt for food in underground chambers and then take them outside the chamber.</p> <p>Night-time activities Wood mice are nocturnal and forage for food during the night. They are very active and run and leap about on their large hind feet. They are very good climbers and often use places such as an old bird's nest high in a tree branch to feed on berries they've collected.</p> <p>Predators Wood mice are an important source of food for many mammalian animals as it is very easy and profitable to catch, especially at night. They are the main prey of the weasel and stoat, fox, marten, badger and even cats will eat them.</p>	<p>Description A hedgehog has sharp spines that cover the top of its body. The lower part of its body is covered in thick, rough, hairy fur. They have bear eyesight but their sense of smell and hearing is very good. If a hedgehog is threatened it will curl up in a ball and raise its spines to protect itself. Hedgehog babies are blind and pink in color, with soft spines.</p> <p>Habitat Hedgehogs live where there is a mixture of grassland, woodland and hedgerows. They are often seen in gardens at night. Hedgehogs hibernate from October to April in a winter state of inactivity but in summer they spend the day in temporary nests.</p> <p>Diet Hedgehogs are mammalian animals. At night they scuffle and grunt as they search for food. They are mainly insect eaters but also eat other kinds of food. Their favourite are beetles, caterpillars, worms, snails, slugs, crabs, millipedes and earthworms but they also like nuts and fruit. Hedgehogs use their sense of hearing and smell to find food and can smell a worm under 2cm of soil.</p> <p>Dangers Hedgehogs are occasionally eaten by foxes and badgers who can unroll them but every year thousands are killed or injured on the road. This is because they curl into a ball when frightened instead of running away. Roadkill is a real danger to hedgehogs who often hibernate in piles of leaves which can be too deep for them. They are also often hit by lawnmowers and trimmers, especially if the grass is long.</p>
